18. Community Services:

The University promotes participation of students and faculty in various extension activities organized by the NSS and other NGOs.

The NSS has 468 units to date spread over numerous affiliated colleges under ANU jurisdiction. The NSS units of ANU area organized voluntary Blood Donation Camps in different colleges. In the last 4 years, 6,716 units of blood were collected through Mega Blood Donation Camps and 87,700 units of blood were collected through Blood Donation Camps in affiliated colleges.

The NSS Cell has adopted 1,000 villages for implementation of various programmes. Socio-economic surveys were undertaken in some of them. Plantation of saplings was made on a massive scale in towns and villages. Red Ribbon Clubs were formed in 90% of the colleges. Adult Literacy Programmes, awareness programmes and rallies were organized regarding various issues like Chikun Gunya, Dengue, Polio, HIV/ AIDS.

Special Camps were organized by the NSS Cell in villages regularly where activities like bush-cutting, laying of approach roads, desalting of water bodies, weeding out unwanted plants in water tanks, digging of drainage

canals, bridging erosion/breaches in irrigation canals were carried out by NSS volunteers.

Dental, Medical and Veterinary camps were also organized and free medicines were distributed in rural areas. Youth Festivals were organized in the three districts under ANU purview, one in each district, every year followed by University-level Youth Festivals. The NSS Cell regularly deputed NSS volunteers to attend National Integration Camps in different colleges and states who have won several prizes.

The NSS Cell also organized workshops, training programmes and disaster management programmes in association with district administration and other organizations. The NSS Coordinator received the Best NSS Coordinator Award (2004) and a Medal (2009) for his contributory efforts for blood donation.

The NSS Cell also sanctioned three Youth Leadership Programmes, one for each of the 3 districts, in the University area. Several environmental awareness rallies were organized by the NSS Cell.

27. Technology upgradation:

The University provided desktop computers to 136 faculty members with Internet and Ernet connectivity. Some faculty members purchased computers with the financial support from different funding agencies. Many academic departments have Computer Labs providing access to students and faculty. In addition, there is a Computer Centre with 60 systems and a special section in the library with 20 systems open for students and faculty. The two centers have internet connectivity.

The University started offering training classes for teachers interested to know basic computer usage and there is a good response. These attempts of the University helped most of the teachers to orient themselves towards computer aided teaching and learning materials.

In addition to the personal computers, the University library has a browsing centre with 20 systems with internet connectivity. There is also a Computer Center with 60 systems. All these centers and labs with internet connectivity are accessible to all the teachers.

Most of the departments have LCD projectors which can be used for Power Point Presentations in the class.

There is a Computer Center in the University in addition to the Browsing center in the library. The main Computer Center is open to students, staff and research scholars from 10.30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The University has an Annual Maintenance Contract with a local hardware agency which undertakes repairs and maintenance of computers in the campus. The Service Engineer is available in the campus on a fulltime basis.

The departments are active in the development of ICT packages for use in the classroom teaching. Power Point Presentation is a regular feature in the classroom teaching.

28. Computer and internet access and training to teachers and students:

The faculty members are attending the refresher and orientation courses conducted by this University and also the Academic Staff Colleges of other Universities located all over the country. Besides this, the faculty members attend seminars, symposia and workshops organized by different Universities from time to time. They are also utilizing the services provided by the University Library where an internet browsing centre with 20 computers was made available for this purpose. Internet facility is also available in the Computer Center of the University. Every teacher is provided with a personal computer and each department is connected with intranet and internet facility.

Audio-visual equipment is used in teaching to make learning easy. Slide Projectors, Overhead Projectors and LCD projectors are regularly used in classroom teaching.

29. Financial aid to students:

About 90 percent of the students get fellowship or stipend from the State Government. The University provides fellowships only to full time Ph.D. scholars (4 from each department) for promoting high order research. Rajiv Gandhi Fellowships sanctioned by Government of India are made available. The University has also introduced a special scholarship scheme to these students, whereby one boy and one girl student is given cash awards worth Rs. 10,000/- each as scholarship for Arts, Sciences and Engineering Courses separately.

Students' welfare is taken care of in a number of ways. For students who prefer to stay in hostels, the university as far as possible allots hostel accommodation evenly and sees that they are comfortable in the hostels. The food that is provided is balanced as per the health parameters. Most of the students receive one or the other scholarship to meet their monthly expenses of food and accommodation in hostels, from a range of funding bodies like Social Welfare Department, Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes and Harijan Christian Scholarships, Economically Poor Persons Scholarships, General Merit Scholarships, Physically Handicapped students' scholarships, Scholarships for children of elementary school teachers, scholarships to the children of deceased government servants, Educational concessions to the

children and grandchildren of political sufferers. In addition to these financial helps as a welfare measure, the university instituted a Student's Welfare Fund in 2006-07, to meet health and welfare of the students, by generating contributions from faculty, supporting staff and students. Also the university college extends Group Insurance Facilities to students under insurance coverage in the form of a group insurance policy and the premium for this policy is met partly from the fees paid by students.

Various Coaching programmes are organized for enabling the students to improve their Career and Placements such as Coaching for entry into Services, NET coaching, coaching for Entrance Tests, etc.

30. Support from the Alumni Association and its activities:

Most of the Alumni placed in diversified occupations generally contribute to the University in the form of instituting prizes, medals and scholarships to meritorious students of various disciplines at undergraduate, postgraduate and research levels and arranging endowment lectures annually. There is an equally good number of Alumni who come forward to contribute part of construction expenses of some buildings of the campus, or donations to library collections of the departments. These are good indicators of university development in different directions. The alumni are also helping in arranging placements and training in industries and field work.

31. Support from the Parent-Teacher Association and its activities:

There is no Parent-Teacher Association in the University.

32. Health Services:

The Health Centre in Acharya Nagarjuna University Campus gives free medical aid to students, staff, research scholars, NMRs and their dependants.

A wide range of cases like upper, lower respiratory tract infections, viral fevers, Jaundice, Diarrhoea, Amoebiasis, duodenal ulcers, fungal infections, Scabies, DM, Hypertension, IHD, Epilepsy and PT are being treated in the Health Centre. Although only outpatient treatment is available at the Health Centre at present, 5 beds are available for observation and treatment of patients. An ambulance is available to take patients in cases of

emergency to bigger hospitals in Guntur and Vijayawada. Homoeopathic treatment is also extended here.

34. Incentive to Outstanding Sports person:

The following incentives are provided to students who are proficient in sports.

- (i) Seats are allocated in PG/UG courses to medal-winning sports persons.
- (ii) Scholarships are provided.
- (iii) Special sports events are conducted through University Sports Council.
- (iv) Financial support is given for participation in sports events outside the University.
- (v) 10% weightage in marks for participation in National and International events is provided.
- (vi) 5% weightage in marks for participation at University level is provided.

(vii) One supernumerary seat in every department with 50% fee concession is provided to the sports persons, who secure first place in All India sports meets.

Besides these, Acharya Nagarjuna University is the first in India to implement the scheme of cash awards to outstanding sports students. Students who win Gold, Silver and Bronze medals in Individual events at All India Inter-University tournaments are awarded Rs. 6000, Rs. 4000, and Rs. 3000 respectively. Similarly students who win the Gold, Silver and Bronze medals in Team events at All India Inter-University tournaments are awarded Rs. 5000, Rs. 4000 and Rs. 3000 respectively. There are cash awards for the winners at zonal level also. Students who win the Gold, Silver and Bronze medals at South or South-West Zone Inter-University team tournaments are awarded Rs. 3000, Rs. 2000 and Rs.1000 respectively.

35. Student achievements and Awards:

Around 70% of the students who complete their courses get employment, or try to develop their skills which help them in getting jobs. The placement record at this level has been highly satisfactory. Around 80% of PG students get placement in various companies and private educational institutions. The coaching programmes and remedial coaching programmes conducted by the University is a major reason for this performance.

36. Activities of the Guidance and Counselling cell:

The University has a Student Counselling Centre that takes care of guidance and counselling of students under the supervision of a teacher of Professor Rank. It has undertaken projects focusing University's Interaction with Society, Know Your Personality Programmes in the years 2007, 2008 respectively. The other programmes it organized for the benefit of university students include Personality and Education Development programme in two phases in the months of August and September respectively. Similar programme for girls was also organized separately. In March 2008 it conducted a programme called "How to Face Interviews" which was very much useful in their further pursuits. In February 2009, it held a programme on Meditation Techniques, Special coaching for campus students appearing for D.Sc. examination of A.P. Government. Three programmes on Communication Skills, Goal Setting, and Presentation Skills are all also well received activities of this Centre.

37. Placement services provided to the students:

The University established Career Guidance and Placement Cell for providing various services to the students.

The Cell helps in :

- ❖ Giving personal guidance to the students in the building up of their career.
- ❖ Conducting campus interviews and helping students in securing practical training facilities in companies or organizations.
- ❖ Helping students in getting stipend during training programmes.

Activities of the Cell:

- ❖ Arranged training for students in Communication Skills.
- ❖ Organized Workshops on Computer Skills with the collaboration of Intel Corporation.
- ❖ Conducted five training programmes for Administrative staff of Acharya Nagarjuna University.

- ❖ Arranged campus interviews to the students of various departments. Around 20 organizations participated in the campus placements during 2005-06.
- ❖ Acted as Liaison department for arranging MoUs between the University Departments and the Industrial Organizations.
- ❖ Brought out students' Placement Brochures for all the students and staff.

Placements :

During 2004-05 to 2008-09 the Cell organized campus placements and 4460 students got placement in prestigious organizations like Cipla, MSN Insurance, ICICT Prudential, Vignan College, Chaitanya College, Bajaj Allianz Insurance, Reliance Life Insurance, Pepsi Company, Sadharan Travels Pvt. Ltd., Rao & Rao Travels Pvt. Ltd., Uni ads Pvt. Ltd. etc.

38. Development programmes for Non-teaching staff:

Skill-based Training Programmes are organized periodically for the benefit of the supporting staff. The Common Computer Centre takes care of the computer courses. Personality Development Programmes were also conducted by outside HR Trainers. To develop Office Management, a three week Computer Training Programme was organized in February, 2009 for the Senior Assistants of the University Campus in association with the Department of Computer Science & Engineering. The focus of the programme was on the use and practice of MS-Word, MS-Excel and Internet. Another training programme on Office Management Skills for officers of the University was conducted during January, 2009. The themes of the programme were File Management, Letter Drafting, Right to Information Act and Personality Development.

Starting from 2002-03 a number of Refresher courses were sanctioned by the UGC to this University. Hundreds of teachers – both from University and affiliated colleges – have benefited from this programme. A series of training programmes have been organized for Non-Teaching staff to improve their skills. Latest in this series is computer training for Senior Assistants. This training was conducted by the Department of HRD from 2nd to 21st February

2009. The department organized another training programme on office management skills for administrative officers of the University.

39. Best practices of the Institution:

The following are the quality measures undertaken by the University in the last 5 years.

- ❖ The meetings of the BOS are regularly held every year and held as frequently as required. Thus curriculum update is regular and continuous following the guidelines of UGC / AICTE / Bar council/ PCI, etc.
- ❖ Introduction of five-year Integrated courses in (i) MBA(IB) and (ii) M.Sc. (Nanotechnology)
- ❖ Each Dept. offers at best two specializations to students to choose from.
- ❖ Organisation of Remedial Courses / NET Coaching / Coaching for entry into Services, Free coaching for Entrance Tests, etc.

- ❖ The University has a transparent admission process. It admits students through Entrance/Merit following all the rules and regulations of Government of AP. It has set up a Directorate of Admissions for this purpose.
- ❖ Acharya Nagarjuna University formulates Academic calendar much in advance.
- ❖ Recruitment of Faculty is as per norms laid down by the Government of A.P. Contractual system for a period of two years is also followed.
- ❖ Focus on use of ICT:
 - i. There is a Centralized Computer Centre for use of all students.
 - ii. All Departments are provided with LCD
 - iii. Implemented a scheme of “Model Class Rooms & Labs”.
 - iv. Each Teacher is provided with a Computer System.
- ❖ Self-Appraisal by Teachers is ensured.
- ❖ Earmarking of 10% Supernumerary seats to students of other States and International Students is followed in the admissions.
- ❖ Semester System and Continuous Evaluation is in force.
- ❖ Significant Weightage to Lab/Field work in professional courses is given.
- ❖ Computerization of Exam Work-result Processing, etc. is done.
- ❖ Systematic grievance redressal mechanism is in place.
- ❖ Malpractice Enquiry Committee looks into SMP cases.
- ❖ Scale of Punishments is approved by the Executive Council.
- ❖ Revaluation of answer scripts
- ❖ Personal verification
- ❖ Supply of Xerox copy of the answer scripts.

- ❖ Research Admissions are conducted every year through Entrance test.
- ❖ Evaluation by foreign adjudicators of Ph.D. thesis is compulsory.
- ❖ Unanimous decision of the adjudicators for the award of Ph.D. is necessary.
- ❖ Exclusive grant is given by the University for organization of seminars/conferences/workshops.
- ❖ Payment of TA/DA to teachers for their presentations before funding bodies.
- ❖ Constitution of “Research Promotion Council” by the Executive Council.
- ❖ Conduct of Viva in an open house
- ❖ Publication of Research Abstracts as a volume titled “Research Focus”.
- ❖ Offering of University Research Fellowships “Four for Every Department” @ Rs. 3000/- per month for those pursuing Ph. D. and not enjoying any other fellowship.
- ❖ Institution of Award for “Women Achievers” on the eve of International Women’s Day.
- ❖ Each Department is provided with at least one “Smart Classroom” and Lab.
- ❖ All the teachers are provided with computer systems & internet connection.
- ❖ Centralized Lab & centralized computer facilities are available.
- ❖ Creation of infrastructure to keep pace with the academic growth of the University is given importance.
- ❖ Constitution of ‘Resource Mobilization committee’ to invite donations from the public and Philanthropists in cash and kind. Complete utilization of Matching share of UGC under this scheme is ensured.

- ❖ The supporting staff members are given training in personality development and skill upgradation. The training programmes helped in changing their attitude towards work and improving their efficiency.
- ❖ The University always ensures that its goals and objectives reach the stakeholders through various means like brochures, newsletters and website.
- ❖ All the important dates concerned with the examinations, application proforma, the developments in the University, salient features of the seminars and conferences organized on the campus will be regularly hosted on the University website.
- ❖ The leadership system is well established and priority is given for decentralization of power and distribution of responsibilities. This is helping the University in achieving the set targets earlier than the schedules.
- ❖ The faculty is involved in every step in decision - making as there is staff representation in every policy-making body of the University.
- ❖ Regular audit on academic matters and procedures is undertaken.
- ❖ The University strictly adheres to the Academic Calendar in teaching and evaluation schedules.
- ❖ The staff recruitment is transparent and is done as per the UGC and Government norms. Merit is given the top priority within the norms prescribed by the academic and administrative bodies.

- ❖ The University has a well-planned budget and all measures are taken to generate additional income from internal sources to compensate for the deficit budget.
- ❖ The Alumni Association of the University is very strong and is supporting the University in academic and financial matters.
- ❖ A section is created to look into the audit objections of the University.
- ❖ A separate cell, viz. Human Resource Development Cell is created to impart communication skills.
- ❖ A Resource mobilization committee was appointed to mobilize internal resources.
